Pending Legislation

State	Bill Number	Status	Summary
Texas	HB 479	5/25/15: Delivered to Governor.	This bill would create a pilot project to provide emergency telemedicine medical services in rural areas.
Texas	HB 550	3/26/15: Laid on the table subject to call.	This bill would clarify certain statutory provisions related to telehealth and telemedicine reimbursement under the TX Medicaid program. Similar to SB 219.
Texas	HB 661	5/5/15: Considered in Calendars.	This bill would adopt the Federation of State Medical Board's Interstate Medical Licensure Compact. Similar to SB 190.
Louisiana	HB 461	4/13/15: Introduced and referred to House Committee on Health and Welfare.	This bill would amend law related to the telemedicine license.
Texas	HB 1475	4/14/15: Withdrawn from schedule.	Relates to telecommunications service discounts for educational institutions, libraries, hospitals, and telemedicine centers.
Texas	HB 1878	5/25/15: Sent to Governor.	This bill would provide for the reimbursement of providers under the Medicaid program for the provision of telemedicine medical services in a school-based setting.

Texas	HB 1940	4/7/15: Left pending in Committee.	This bill would allow a dental hygienist to use telemedicine to practice dental hygiene in any setting authorized by law for the practice of dental hygiene.
Texas	HB 2004	5/12/15: Referred to Health and Human Services Committee.	This bill would establish a pilot project to provide emergency telemedicine medical services in rural areas.
Texas	HB 2082	5/18/15: Referred to Senate Committee on Health and Human Services.	This bill would develop a pilot program to provide telemedicine medical services to certain children.
Texas	HB 2172	4/8/15: Left pending in Committee.	<p>This bill stipulates that a health benefit plan may not cover a telemedicine medical service unless the provider:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Is licensed; 2. Has an established physician-patient relationship; 3. Is able to verify the patient's identity; 4. Discusses risks and benefits with the patient; 5. Advises the patient to seek in-person care if symptoms do not improve; 6. Provides only services that are medically indicated; 7. Adopts protocols to prevent fraud and abuse; 8. Does not violate state or federal laws relating to patient privacy; 9. Maintains proper medical records; 10. Does not treat chronic pain with certain controlled substances; and 11. Practices according to appropriate standards. <p>According to this bill, a telemedicine provider may establish a physician-patient relationship in an initial encounter. Informed consent is required in this bill.</p>
Texas	HB 2250	3/13/15: Referred to Public Health Committee	This bill would require written informed consent to deliver telehealth that must be retained in a patient's medical record. It also states that a treating physician can determine whether the presence of a physician or health professional is required at the originating site, as well as if the patient's residence is an appropriate site for the patient to receive services.

Texas	HB 2796	3/16/15: Referred to State Affairs Committee	This bill would allow certain telecommunications providers to commit to making infrastructure and network improvements in exchange for support from the universal service fund. Among other things, it would provide the necessary infrastructure in rural areas to support access to telemedicine applications. It would also allow for private network services to telemedicine centers (among other venues).
Texas	HB 3127	4/15/15: Left pending in Committee.	This bill would relate to the authority of certain telecommunications providers to commit to making infrastructure and network improvements in exchange for support from the universal service fund.
Texas	HB 3444	3/18/15: Referred to House Public Health Committee	This bill relates to the provision of telemedicine medical services by a physician.
Texas	HB 3476	5/14/15: Referred to Health and Human Services Committee.	This bill would allow for the reimbursement of home telemonitoring services, telemedicine medical services and telehealth services under the Medicaid program.
Texas	HB 3753	3/24/15: Referred to State Affairs Committee	This bill provides for telecommunications service discounts for educational institutions, libraries, hospitals and telemedicine centers.
Texas	SB 190	1/27/15: Introduced and referred to Health and Human Services	This bill would adopt the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact developed by the Federation of State Medical Boards. (Similar to HB 661)
Texas	SB 1119	3/16/15: Referred to Health and Human Services Committee	This bill establishes a pilot project to evaluate the use of telepractice to provide certain services to children and adults with an autism spectrum disorder.
Texas	SB 1177	3/17/15: Referred to Health and Human Services Committee	This bill defines telemedicine and telehealth and establishes specific rules pertaining to when a physician can prescribe controlled substances via telemedicine. It does state that a physician-patient relationship can be established in an initial encounter through the use of telecommunications technology.

Texas	SB 1689	3/23/15: Referred to Health and Human Services Committee	This bill would provide for the reimbursement of providers under the Medicaid program for the provision of telemedicine medical services in a school-based setting.
Texas	SB 1886	3/25/15: Referred to Health and Human Services Committee	This bill would establish a telemedicine medical services program for children with chronic or complex medical needs. The program would enable an eligible child to receive medical assistance benefits for health care services provided in the child's residence through telemedicine and provide reimbursement to pediatric subspecialists who provide telemedicine medical services.

Louisiana	HCR 4	5/19/15: Adopted	This bill is a concurrent resolution to express the intent of the legislature regarding the standard of care that physicians are required to use in the practice of telemedicine pursuant to the provisions of Act No. 442 of the 2014 Regular Session of the Legislature of Louisiana.
Texas	SB 219	4/2/15: Signed by Governor. Effective immediately.	This bill would clarify certain statutory provisions related to telehealth and telemedicine reimbursement under the TX Medicaid program. (Similar to HB 550.)

Texas	40 TAC 12.362.362.1	5/18/15: Proposed rule Comment Deadline: 6/28/15	Title: Definitions Agency: Board of Occupational Therapy Examiners This rule would clarify definitions with regard to occupational therapy examiners and add new definitions related to telehealth.
Texas	40 TAC 12.372.372.1	5/18/15: Proposed rule Comment Deadline: 6/28/15	Title: Provision of Services Agency: Board of Occupational Therapy Examiners This rule would add the requirement that the occupational therapist who screens, evaluates, or implements the plan of care is responsible for determining the need for the physical presence of an occupational therapy practitioner during any interactions with clients. The regulation clarifies further issues related to the delivery of care through telehealth.

An online questionnaire through email, electronic text, chat or telephonic evaluation would not be considered adequate.
Texas	TAC, Title 22, 9.190.B.190.8	4/10/15: Adopted	Title: Disciplinary Guidelines Agency: TX Medical Board This rule amends the state's definition of the physician-patient relationship (needed to prescribe any dangerous drug or controlled substance) to require either an in-person exam or face to face visit. * This rule is currently not in effect due to a lawsuit.
